

## Week of October 11, 2015

**This Week's Focus:** Jesus Christ, truly God and truly man, is the full expression of God's grace and truth.

This Week's Text: John 1:14-18

"All we who believe in Jesus have received an abundant supply of all that our souls need out of the full store that resides in Him for His people. It is from Christ and Christ alone, that all our spiritual wants have been supplied." J. C. Ryle

## Observations and Questions for Discussion:

- What are your general impressions of this week's sermon?
- Why is the incarnation of such importance? Why is it insufficient to believe that Jesus merely took on the appearance of a human being? What is Gnosticism? How does John's prologue combat the heresy of Gnosticism?

- What does it mean that Jesus is both "truly God and truly man?" Reference Philippians 2:6-8.
  Why shouldn't we emphasize Jesus' humanity at the expense of his deity? Why shouldn't we emphasize Jesus' deity at the expense of his humanity? How is the reality of the incarnation of Jesus Christ a message of good news and hope? Reference Hebrews 4:15-16.
- Why does John state that Jesus "tabernacled" among us? What was the purpose of the tabernacle in the Old Testament? How does Jesus fulfill the types and shadows of God's communion with His people?
- What Old Testament story would come to mind for John's audience when they read verses 17 and 18? Reference Exodus 32-34. How is the law of Moses an expression of God's grace toward sinful humanity? Why is the law inefficient to save us from our sin? Discuss how Jesus' sacrifice and the new covenant in his shed blood is the "grace upon grace" necessary to save us from our sin.
- Where is God's glory in the Gospel according to John most brilliantly displayed?
- How can we live in a way that practically demonstrates the Gospel and points to Jesus as the full expression of God's grace and truth? Does the sweetness of God's grace toward you produce in you a desire to declare and demonstrate the Gospel to the world?
