THIS WEEK'S FOCUS

God intends the many trials that Christians face to produce Gospel maturity.

QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION (Use along with Reading: Ante Faciem Dei)

- 1. Who is this letter written to, and why?
- 2. Why do all humans instinctively desire joy? What's the difference between joy and happiness?
- 3. What trials are you currently undergoing? What's your mindset and your typical way of handling them?
- 4. Scripture trains us to respond to trials with our minds, not our feelings. Why?
- 5. How does a mindset of joy differ from simply thinking positive thoughts? How does one better prepare for trials than the other?
- 6. How do we reconcile James' command to consider it a joy when facing trials with other passages of Scripture that encourage lament?
- 7. What place does community play in times of hardship?
- 8. What does James mean that the testing of our faith produces steadfastness? Does "perfect and complete, lacking nothing" refer to sinless perfection (verse 4)?
- 9. Discuss how trials are opportunities for spiritual maturity.
- 10. What is the eternal joy that we should set our minds on?
- 11. How was Jesus able to endure the greatest of trials? How can we keep the gospel fixed in our minds?

- Trails in the Christian's life reveal the genuineness of our faith in Christ.
